The original bridge rehabilitation chart has the different phases of the project listed on the left. Each phase is listed by line items 1 thru 21, the name of the phase of the rehabilitation, and the duration and dates to completion. The right side shows a mirror image of the same information in graph form.

The bridge rehabilitation started out at a rapid pace and was well ahead of schedule until the numerous snow events shut down the project for two and a half weeks in February. As of February 18, phases 1 thru 6 and phases 8 and 10 have been completed. Phase 7 is three days from completion. Since there is no way to predict future weather conditions, a 'guesstimate' of the opening of the bridge would be about **April 16, 2021** and we hope to be able to completely close the dam valve on or before **March 19, 2021**.

The Board of Trustees and the Bridge & Roads Committees thank you all for your understanding and patience.


2 March-April 2021 Meet the Candidate

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



We are Lake Lorelei.


We are the place in Brown County, Ohio where people live, work, party, swim, share, serve and celebrate!





First and foremost. PRIDE would like to thank all of you for your donations to the calendar. This is our



main fundraiser to make projects happen and we sincerely appreciate your donations and support of PRIDE. Without you we would not be able to accomplish all the things that keep Lake Lorelei beautiful throughout the year. Lakeside Gardening

At this point in winter not many are thinking there are any garden chores to do, but this is the perfect time to prune some things while they are still dormant: clematis, decorative honeysuckle, woody shrubs and Japanese maples.

Let's start with clematis. There are three different varieties, so check the guidelines for which one you have as to how to prune; woody shrubs can be pruned heavenly to thin out or to shape to a more manageable size, and I'm going to really thin out 3 Japanese maples that need more light and air circulation that will help their looks and health.

Remember everyone, pruning is not a scary thing, you will not harm any plant by over or under pruning. Think of it like grass cutting, you're telling your plants to put out more growth each time you prune. Hydrangea pruning should be left alone until mid to late May; you should be able to see where all your new growth is by then and you can cut back any dead, woody stems back to the nearest green sprouts.

Over the years I have made a checklist of fertilizing times that has coincided with where we are at in a plant's growth. Here are some plants and times to fertilize:

- Blackberries early spring
- Bone meal for carrots at seed planting
- Wait to fertilize tomatoes until they set fruit
 - Cukes & tomatoes are heavy feeders so give 2 or 3 feedings per season



Onions & garlic like a high nitrogen fertilizer, the bigger their leaves, the bigger the bulb will be!



I use organic fertilizers for all of our vegetables, but for flowers I will use Miracle Grow. Hydrangeas like feedings in March, May and July for continuous bloom.

Gardening is trying different ideas and techniques. Don't be afraid of experimenting; books can only teach you so much. If you think it might work, try it!

Hopefully we can start playing in our gardens very soon.

Recycling Hints & Tips

Recycling drop-off boxes are accessible seven days a week, 24 hours a day in Brown County. The boxes accept only the following materials:

<u>Metal</u>

Aluminum Cans, clean steel foodcans, aerosol cans (lids & tips removed)



Glass Bottles, Jars & Jugs

(remove lids)

Clean glass bottles, jars, and jugs. Any color. No window glass, mirrors, vases, etc. Only clean bottles, jars, & jugs.



<u>Plastic Bottles, Jars & Jugs</u> (remove lids)

Clean plastic bottles & jugs, including: pop, shampoo, milk,water, laundry detergent, andbleach bottles.

No plastic bags, margarine/cottage cheese tubs, kitty litter buckets, Styrofoam, or any plastic that is not a <u>bottle</u>, jar, <u>or jug</u>.

Also, NO oil, pesticide, or herbicide containers.

<u>Paper</u>

Newspaper, <u>flattened</u> boxes, junk mail, paper, books, magazines, catalogs, phonebooks, cardboard, clean pizza boxes, cereal & snack boxes,



shredded paper (please leave in a bag), etc.

Plastic Bags

During the sorting process at Adams Brown Recycling, our workers must <u>open each bag</u> that comes through.

If you are using a bag for your recyclables, please empty the items into the drop box or curbside cart and take the bag home to reuse or discard.

Plastic shopping bags can be recycled at most grocery stores

What is <u>NOT</u> recycled at Adams Brown Recycling?

- Plastic bags, plastic toys, or plastic dishes
- Margarine, yogurt and cottage cheese containers, and similar tub containers Single serve fruit, Jell-O, and pudding containers
- "Clamshell" type containers
- 5 gallon buckets, Kitty litter buckets, etc.
- Potting containers for plants (pots, trays, cell packs) Styrofoam, packaging foam, peanuts
- Window glass, dishes, vases, decorative glassware, ceramics, mirrors Microwave dishes, trays, or bowls
- Motor oil, herbicide, or pesticide containers

I urge all to review the following photos, and to go out and observe first-hand the seriousness of the situation.


Let's put our differences aside, unite, and approve this much needed assessment. It's time to revive and protect our number one asset: our beautiful Lake.

Lake Life

In 1975, the **BALD EAGLE** was nearly extinct in Ohio, with just four nests in the entire state. But thanks to conservation efforts, laws such as the Endangered Species Act and the ban of the pesticide DDT, they have made an amazing recovery.

To the best of my family's recollection, we began seeing them at Lake Lorelei around eight or ten years ago. Bald Eagles share their habitat with Great Blue Herons and Ospreys, two other species making a comeback at the lake. While eagles will eat a variety of small mammals, birds, and even dead and decaying animals, their preferred food is—luckily for us—*fish*. With incredibly sharp eyesight, a Bald Eagle can see a fish surfacing from a mile away then soon pluck it from the water with its powerful four-inch talons.

Eagles build their nests in tall trees, which they prefer to be near water. They're thought to mate for life and will reuse the same nest; each year adding material until it can become six feet deep and weigh a ton! An eagle pair will typically lay two eggs in late winter, which incubate for around 35 days and hatch in April. Young eagles will first leave the nest in July or early August. Some may mistake a juvenile Bald Eagle for a large hawk or Golden Eagle because it takes five or six years before they develop the characteristic white head feathers. Bald Eagles fly with their wings nearly flat—not tilted up like the ubiquitous Turkey Vulture.

Adults mostly stay close to their nests throughout the year, but immature eagles may migrate during the winter months. After three or four years, they are old enough to breed and will usually nest within 100 miles of where they were born. This behavior and our ongoing efforts to improve water quality suggest a bright future for these magnificent residents here at Lake Lorelei!

The Legend Looks Back

<u>March/April issues</u>

1971

- **Ten** people were running for the three open positions on the Board of Trustees: Robert Eckstein, L. Monty Erb, Arnold Hurley, Herbert Lust, Kenneth Morse, Jake Ruffley, Hazel Schmees, LaVonne Shull, Charles Tunks, and Vernon Ward.
- Door-to-door mail service was approved! Members were instructed to submit a mailing form and erect roadside mailboxes as required.
- A Trash & Treasure Auction was planned for April 24th by the Beautification Committee. A Fishing Derby was scheduled for May 1st by the team who published the Legend (known as the Booster Club then).
- The Entertainment Committee made plans to purchase a portable bar, ice-making machine and tape recorder for future dances and functions.

1981

- **Seven** Lake members ran for the three open Trustee positions: Jerry Dierks, Edward W. Fuhrmann, Oliver (Butch) Henry, James Dennis Hicks, Joseph C. Ketterer, Thomas J. Kitchen, and Charles E. Osterman.
- A latrine that was positioned near Lake Fichtelberg was destroyed by arson. An \$800 reward was established and funded by the BOT and private donations, for arrest and conviction.
- Thirty-three separate improvement projects were promoted with a project leader named for each team, to be completed during the annual "B & B" Weekend on the first weekend in May.



1991

- There were **five** candidates running for the Board of Trustees: Lee M. Agee, Thomas Hager, James Hill, Donald E. Jaspers and Harry C. Scott, III.
- The Dredging Assessment was PASSED with 242 voting YES and 166 voting NO.
- A lawsuit, brought by Doris Kitchen (and three other parties) against the LLPOA and other individuals prior to April 1990, was still ongoing. The Legend was advised to not publish any articles or letters regarding this lawsuit. It seemed to be very controversial as more than 50% of the FOUR BOT meeting minutes published, contained information about it (There were two BOT meetings scheduled each month at this point in time).
- A boating safety course was offered by the ODNR to be held at the Clubhouse on April 26th. Fishing tournaments were scheduled for the first and third Wednesday evening of each month, beginning May 3rd.

•The Maintenance crew was busy over the winter constructing new picnic tables for the Pavilion.



Fish Committee




