

### **Board of Trustees - President's Report**

As summer fades behind us and fall approaches, we reflect back on the return of normal function and fun activities in our lake community that covid restrictions had taken away last year. The board and I are committed to working as a team to get back to normalcy, overcome our challenges, and put in the work and dedication to improve our community. It was a good summer here at the lake, after the covid restrictions were lifted and we got back to some sort of normal life.

We have shown our unity as members again this year by coming together and voting to proceed with the Dredging Lake Fund. I'm very proud of members and the BOT that worked so hard to make this come to life, so we can move forward to make Lake Lorelei a viable and sought-after community in the future.

We decided to move forward with a new management style here at the lake and did so by implementing a **Lake Director** position who oversees all operations and daily business matters of the community, and I see a positive direction moving forward with a clear and transparent leadership approach. I see a move in the right direction that our Director has set forth with his interaction with committees, groups, and individuals by having a positive approach with clear and transparent leadership.

The employee situation at the office, guard shack, and maintenance has been challenging over the last year with the loss of some old-time employees. Fortunately, we have hired some new personnel, all across the different positions. Office staff is as efficient as I can remember in the past, and maintenance is doing a great job with the part-time crews covering the grounds. There are new faces at the guard shack with many favorable comments. I want to congratulate all of them on doing a good job.

We still have a lot of projects ahead of us that we are working on. Modernization of our office computer system is one of them and is being headed up by our Lake Director. We are looking at new programs that other communities use that would afford us the capability to pay dues online, vote online, mass communications to members, and update our webpage. Our present system is antiquated and cannot keep up with our business needs.

We will be coming out with a few items to vote on this fall. One of them being the term limit of Trustees. The membership collectively put a petition together with enough signatures of members to signify a vote, as per our governing documents. Another item is to raise new membership fees going forward, that would not affect any existing members, just new members purchasing property. The last item is that we would like to research an electronic voting program.

The **Roads Committee** will be overseeing and scheduling paving this fall. In addition, when the lake goes to winter pool level, we will have our underground gas tanks cleaned. This is not an easy task and we are getting bids on that, to hopefully be completed by spring.

I want to thank all the committee volunteers for all they have done here at the Lake this summer: the events have been fun; the kayak & canoe launch at the end of the cove; restroom makeovers; clubhouse improvements; and water testing & research. If you are not aware, this is all done by volunteers, as are the board positions (unpaid, doing the best we can for our community). Please volunteer for any committee that you have experience or knowledge of, so that we can continue to improve our community.

I would like to invite all our members to participate in our board meetings going forward and join our committees. Please patronize our restaurant and marina as they are our hometown businesses that count on your support. We most recently received notice the liquor transfer is almost complete and should be final in a few weeks, which means the restaurant will soon have a full liquor license.

Please be respectful of other members and respect all the rules on the lake and off the lake. We are all here to improve the community and enjoy what it offers. 🖏

## Water Quality & Shoreline Committee Request



### We have a BIG ASK (it involves Steak Dinner)

You may have noticed that the lake has appeared exceptionally green and, if we are honest, at times gross. The growth of multiple kinds of algae and bacteria in our lake is skyrocketing for several reasons, but we have the power to change the results. Let's start with what we know and then the BIG ASK:

#### We know:

All bodies of water have several types of algae—some algae are good, some algae are harmful. If a lake has a balance of both types of algae, water quality is good...it is when harmful algae outnumbers good algae that high levels of bacteria or Harmful Algae Blooms (HAB's) develop, and the lake water reaches unsafe conditions that could make animals and humans sick.



#### A **watershed** is any land area that drains into a body of water when it rains or snows—Creeks, stormwater inlets, road & driveway runoff, ditches & culverts, downspouts & lawns, So understanding and mapping out our own watershed was a big deal. All lakefront properties, all LL surrounding acreage, all LLPOAowned properties, farm land, and other local lands impact the watershed. Take a look at the watershed flow map—you might be surprised at what you thought you knew about your own yard (I was!). This part of the project required some dedicated work by those on the WQ committee and we are grateful.

#### Help Wage War on Bad Stuff:

Bad stuff is defined as ANYTHING that feeds the harmful algae and allows it to outnumber the good algae. Harmful algae has a robust appetite for nutrients especially nitrogen and phosphorus. When the nutrient supply chain gets out of control, it leads to a green lake, and ultimately to water toxicity (Harmful Algae Blooms-HABs) that could be harmful to dogs, cats, little humans, and anyone with a compromised immune system.


**Good News**—We can make changes on a small scale to a few areas and have the impact we all want. It is going to take all of us. So here it is...the **BIG ASK:** 

**>Weeds are Plants:** Stop killing and weed-eating the plants that are growing along the watershed drainage inlet, hillsides, and ditches. Let the plants/weeds grow as tall as the plant can because the taller the plant, the longer the roots grow deep into the soil. The fantastic thing about plants' root systems is that they act as a very efficient filter and absorb the "Bad Stuff" running off our properties and roads. We could build expensive filters for every drainage inlet OR let plants do what they do best; absorb nutrient runoff.

- Allow plants/weeds in drainage ditches and on hillsides to grow 4 to 10 inches...Easy, right? But, some say, we will all have to look at a bunch of weeds in all the inlets?! Yes, it's true! The lake will look like a lake, beautifully natural with far less HAB's.
- Stop spraying weed killers. Commercial weed killers contain Glyphosate a phosphorous chemical that Blue-Green algae absorb. It's the ultimate steak dinner for Harmful Algae Blooms.

**Always mow** away from the water's edge to keep cuttings out of the lake, so you are not adding gravy to the steak dinner. Don't rake or blow leaves into the lake either...that is dessert!

**Great news** on Riprap! The number of properties around the lake that need some work (i.e., riprapping) to keep their shoreline from collapsing into the lake has dropped from nearly 150 five years ago to only 33 last year. Those of you who made this happen, those of you who were never on the list in the first place, THANK YOU. You ROCK. (pun intended). So add rock where needed and allow plants to grow in the rocks to help slow erosion and decrease HAB's.

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## Lakes Fund Update

#### WHAT IS NEW WITH THE LAKES FUND

Hello everybody. Welcome to a new series of articles in the Legend of Lorelei. This new series of articles will be dedicated to the Lake Fund Execution status. It will attempt to give you the latest information available as it related to status, schedules, finances, and other items as they arise. We intend to communicate via many mediums in the future, but of course the Legend of Lorelei is a gem that is so well put together it will be invaluable. That said, let's review what has been happening since the ballot passed.

The last 30 days (yes, only 30 days) has been a very busy time to say the least. Since the middle of July, all the effort can be categorized with an action step called "Organize and Initiate". That is a short saying, but it is critical work. If you have experience running projects, or teams, or really any effort that has a lot of people, you know that planning and developing the proper structure is critical to get right even before work begins. Here is the work since the passing of the Ballot:

**<u>Organize</u>** (Every step here has been accomplished in the last 30 days!!!):

- 1. Develop an overall vision of the workload.
- 2. Develop a clear vision of what success is at the end of the work (In this case just Phase 1).
- 3. Develop a structure that will deliver that vision with excellence while at or under budget.
- 4. Form the leadership team to deliver that vision.
- 5. Understand what teams are necessary and how they need to be organized to support the end vision.
- 6. Draft Lead team and sub-team written charters with items to do the following:
  - a. Define the team objective.
  - b. Define what the team is accountable for and assign them deliverables and tracking of them.
  - c. Define the team decision making and execution boundaries.
  - d. Define how the teams will function, which includes how they will make decisions.
  - e. Define the leadership team.
  - f. Develop staffing.
- 7. Reach alignment of 1 -6 above with the BOT as the chartering body.
- 8. Understand who can do the work. In this case, develop a volunteer list.
- 9. Staff the leadership team.

We are now in the "initiation" stage of Phase 1. That consists of the following:

#### Initiate:

- 1. Communicate plans to date with the Community.
- 2. Bring your leadership team together and align to the draft charters.
- 3. Bring the volunteers together and staff the sub-teams.
- 4. Sub-teams align to their charters to ratify or modify their charter.
- 5. BOT aligns to the charter, signs them, and they change of "draft" to "execute".
- 6. Project Kick Off with Volunteer leaders and teams.

### Lake Safety Patrol Advisory!

#### EXCESSIVE SPEED:

The LLPOA Board of Trustees approved, and recently purchased, a new Bushnell Velocity **Speed Gun for the detection of watercraft speeds** in excess of **35 mph** during the period **between sunrise and sunset**, as well as speeds in excess of **6 mph** during the period **between sunset and sunrise**. Because excessive speeds are highly dangerous to every type of recreational activity on Lake Lorelei, the Lake Safety Patrol (LSP) will be monitoring all accelerated watercraft, from time to time. Your consistent cooperation in following Lake Lorelei's water speed limits, will be very much appreciated! If, however, an excessive speed is registered on the velocity speed gun, the LSP patroller will visibly motion, while activating the patrol boat's siren, and/or the flashing oscillating lights. For everyone's safety, in the event those signals are directed toward your watercraft, please be sure to quickly power down, and pull over, preferably into the nearest cove.

#### **RECKLESS OPERATION:**

As a friendly reminder, navigating a watercraft in a manner other than counterclockwise (shoreline on the starboard side), except to pick up a fallen person, is **reckless operation**. A few other examples of reckless operation include: zigzagging shore-to-shore; changing direction or performing "donuts" within the water-ski or open zones; creating a wake within 150 feet of the marina; and, towing without a spotter.

The motto of the LSP is **Safety via Civility!** Our **mission** is to promote a safe and enjoyable environment for all recreational activities on Lake Lorelei by fostering respect for, and compliance with, the Ohio and LLPOA Lake Rules and Regulations. All LSP volunteers are your neighbors, and for that reason, your cooperation, courtesy, thumbs-up, and friendly waves are so very much appreciated. Thank you for your support!!! **\***



## Lakeside Gardening

As we approach fall there is still quite a bit of gardening to do for those who don't want to quite call it a year.

- \* The end of August is a great time to start cool weather crops that are not effected by mild frost to extend your growing season and to put away a few more veggies for the winter months. These include radishes, leaf lettuce, spinach and baby carrots. Be patient with the seeds you plant since they like cooler temps to germinate, keep them watered well.
- \* A key to a healthy garden is cleaning up your flower & veggie beds of debris which can give unwanted insects a safe haven to winter over and cause more problems the following year.
- This is an excellent time to plant spring flowering bulbs which are available at many garden centers this time of year. Using bone meal in each planting hole will aide in your success come spring. Planting now allows the root system plenty of time to establish itself.
- \* Fall is the best time to plant trees & shrubs since the root system has plenty of time to take hold before winter comes. The cooler temps are less stressful on new plantings.
- \* One of the things I do each fall is amend my soil in each of my 10 vegetable beds. This could include tilling manure or leaves into the beds. Each growing season depletes your soil of nutrients which will affect next year's crop, so amend your soil and use organic fertilizers to give yourself the best chance of an abundant crop.
- \* This might be my most important fall tip since I have seen people with new summer plantings of shrubs, perennials and trees forget to water them in deeply before winter hits. Hey you spent good money on these plants; the root systems are establishing themselves and need regular watering to flourish.

### Lake Life

### Where are the bats?

Bats are amazing animals. They're the only mammal capable of flight, they hunt using sonar, and — despite being roughly the size of a mouse—can live up to four decades. We have fourteen species of bat

here in Ohio, and all of them are insectivores, meaning their diets consist exclusively of—you guessed it—insects. A bat will consume thousands of insects on a single night, up to its own body weight. Many farmers know that bats are the chief insect consumers in the state, providing protection from destructive insects which could ravage crops like corn or soybeans. They also help disperse seeds and are important to some plant species as pollinators. Importantly for us here at the lake, bats also keep down populations of annoying insects like flies and mosquitoes.

This is our twenty-third summer at the lake, and it used to be that at the end of the day as the sun was receding, we could look forward to seeing numerous small bats appear, putting on a stunningly aerobatic flying display overhead. But now, we'd consider ourselves lucky to see a single bat in a week.

So what has happened? Many bats are unfortunately killed by the increasing use of wind turbines used for power generation, but the major cause of the decline is a fungal disease called "white-nose syndrome" or "WNS" for short. It afflicts hibernating bats and sometimes looks like a white fuzz on the bat's face, which is how the disease got its name. For reasons not well understood, the fungus causes a change in behavior in the affected bats. They have been observed doing strange things such as interrupt their hibernation to fly outside during the winter. Since there are no bugs available then, they starve to death. WNS has killed millions of bats in North America. In some caves, the death rate is 90-100 percent.

The WNS fungus was first observed in a cave in upstate New York in 2007 and has quickly spread throughout the U.S. and Canada. The fungus which causes WNS was unknown to science before being found in New York, but it has now also been found in Europe and Asia. It doesn't make bats there as sick as it does here, so I suspect it first emerged there and the bats and fungus co-evolved. As of today, there is no cure for WNS, but scientists from all over the world are looking for ways to mitigate or control it. One hopeful development is a "virally-vectored Pd antigen-induced antifungal immunity" vaccine currently being tested, but there are many problems with this: for instance, figuring out the logistics of how to actually vaccinate the bats!

An alternate title for this article could have been, "Why are there so many bugs?" In nature, all living things are connected, and changes to a species some would consider insignificant can drive impacts far removed from just that one creature. You can help bats by building a bat house in your yard, reducing outside lighting, and planting/not cutting trees, among other things. There are lots of great online resources. One good place to start is Bat Conservation International's site: **www.batcon.org**. Like so many wild creatures, bats are not loved by all, but I hope most of us can acknowledge that the world is better for us all with them rather than without them. In other words, the more you learn about our bats, the more you're guano appreciate them! **\***

## MEET ME...at the Lake

#### Sandy's Beach Bar and Grill

Everyone knows that starting a business is not an easy task. And starting a restaurant, in the middle of a pandemic, in a gated community...even more challenging! But **SANDY CAMPBELL** is handling it all with a smile.

"It has been a learning experience. But the people are wonderful. They keep us going. They tell us how glad they are that we are here—and I tell them how glad we are to be here!" said Sandy. "It's been good—this community is filled with super sweet people."

Sandy and her family have lived here at the lake two years this month. They love the area, and the lake life has provided the needed change they were seeking. While her now adult kids are out of the house, she keeps busy with her newest project.



"I have always dreamed of owning a restaurant. My mom has owned two restaurants and I worked in food service for seniors for several years. This is truly my dream job," Sandy explained. She went on to say that she and Rich, her husband and business partner, have plans to expand the menu over time. They are in the process of getting their liquor license. All of the paperwork has been submitted and the inspections completed, but it takes time for the paperwork to be approved. "We think that will make a difference in the amount of people we serve," she said.

Their menu has increased dramatically since the first months of just pizza, sandwiches, and fries (with a few other items). Now they offer 13 different sandwiches, flatbread and regular pizza, kid's meals, 12 appetizers, salads and

their incredible ice cream and shakes. It's a large and varied selection coming out of a tiny workspace! And that has been one of the issues.

Some of the subtle complaints since the beginning have been about the amount of time it takes to receive an order. That is one of the reasons for the menu expansion. For example, it takes 25 minutes for a pizza to bake. But flatbread pizza, 5-8 minutes! They are also in the process of purchasing a larger, belt-driven pizza oven, larger deep fryers, and possibly rearranging things a bit to take advantage of every inch of available space.

"We have a very small kitchen and no practical way to enlarge it. When we are really busy with three or four of us in this space, we are almost on top of one another. But we are learning our system so that we can be more productive in a small space," Sandy laughed. "We always cook to order. Fresh food takes time."

When they have an overflow in seating, they can use the sunken area of the clubhouse as well as the bar area when their liquor license comes through. In addition, the patio is a perfect spot for an evening appetizer while gazing at the beautiful Lake Lorelei! While both areas will help with seating, the speed of food will take continual adding, changing, and learning what the community wants. Since they are open year-round, they hope to change up their menu for winter type foods in the fall.

"We have great plans," Sandy said. "Our customers are so supportive, and we are striving to keep them happy!" 3

Bill, with a very shocked look on his face, said, "OH MY GOD, I'm so sorry!" and jumped out of the truck laughing his head off.

(May 27, 1924 - August 04, 2021)


